

OFFICIAL PROCEEDINGS
BOARD OF LINCOLN COUNTY COMMISSIONERS
March 4, 2008

Chairman Connelly called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. Others in attendance included: Commissioner Archibald; County Clerk, Jeanne Wagner and Commissioner's Secretary, Corey Roberts. Commissioner Harmon was absent from the meeting.

PARA 1: Commissioner Archibald moved to approve the agenda for this day and Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 2: Commissioner Archibald moved to approve the minutes from February 19, 2008 and the Special Meeting held on February 26, 2008. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 3: Years of Service awards were presented to the following: Heidi Beachler – 15 years; Jason Rosas – 10 years; Veau Beutler – 10 years.

PARA 4: Chairman Connelly opened the Public Hearing at 10:30 a.m. for the 07/08 Budget Transfer from the Unreserved Fund Account to the South Lincoln Hospital Agreement Fund. Public comments were as follows: Eric Boley thanked the Commissioners for their assistance. They have discussed bringing in an outside group to help with collections, but they would like to go through an interview process with some of the entities that they have received information on. Cash flows have increased and they have lowered the accounts receivable by around \$300,000. With the new rate increases, they will benefit from that. They have cut costs tremendously and have only allowed absolute necessary overtime. It is just a matter of time to catch up and work their way out of a hole. They are on the fast track on the critical access conversion and policies and procedures are being worked on. He said they will report to the Commissioners on benchmark activities. Commissioner Archibald stated she would like to see what is called a dashboard report, and had concerns on whether this money is a loan or a grant. Eric asked for it to be a grant. Nick Bettas representing Chevron Mining said there are no written records of what the hospital has requested from the Commissioners and what the county can or can't do. These legalities are figured out by an Attorney General's opinion. He would like to see information entered into by public record with information from the hospital district stating what they need, what it is used for, and how much money is needed so taxpayers can see. He suggested an objective management team that may be directed by the Commission and not the district, and to seek help from hospital association. Harvey Jackson, an employee of the hospital, asked why only \$500,000 was being transferred today and not more than that. He had issues with hiring someone to look at the hospital and accounts receivables/payables. He voiced his support for the current management. Chris Krell, a physician and Chief of Staff for the hospital, stated that it is easy to be in control when money is plenty, but things are changing nationally and this is a big issue. Over 200 hospitals have been lost in the last year and the projection is 500 in the next 5 years. They are looking at large cuts in Medicare reimbursement. Some reasons for the shortfall were beyond the control of the

management team, but they are being accountable for everything. He wished the Commissioners the best of luck in making decisions for the county and medical issues that might arise in the next 5 years. Lou Ann Carmichel, Director of Nursing for long term care, talked about the issues with the Lusk Hospital in which they hired a group to come in and the management of the hospital didn't know what was happening. The hospital was eventually closed, but then the Commissioners rallied and were able to reopen the hospital. She is not in favor of the QHR Management Firm and would like to see the Commissioners let the current management fix what has happened, which a 100 percent of the problem was not caused from them. If the hospital management isn't successful, then bring in a management group. Commissioner Archibald stated they are in no way ready to hire any outside management firm. Eric Boley said he hid nothing from the Commissioners, or the Hospital Board and he takes responsibility for what happened. There was no fraud or no abuse and he came for help. He has been 100 percent honest and will continue to be to have a partnership with the Commissioners. Sue Pearson, Manager for Lincoln County Public Health said she worked for larger hospitals that were run by QHR and they destroyed the hospitals. The healthcare industry across the country is in a downhill slide and she gives the hospital her whole support. County Treasurer, Jerry Greenfield discussed the financials from the hospital and how the \$500,000 budget transfer came about. The hospital has a cash flow problem and the financial report he had showed \$464,000 in the red, but they are not in a broke situation. If they can collect receivables in timely fashion they can handle the payables. Dottie Edwards, an employee of the hospital said she is a people person and is not much for numbers. When this first came about the employees were in shock and they didn't know it was coming. They were angry and hurt, and were concerned where they were going to go and not where they've been. She went to a board meeting for the first time with a chip on her shoulder and wanted an explanation. Her questions were answered, and Eric and Curtis admitted to mistakes and said they were going to work to get it better. She is not part of management at the hospital, but part of the heart of the hospital. The employees are working as a group, and they will be successful as things will be dealt with more promptly in the future, she believes. Mary Frances Hunzie, Hospital Board Member, asked the Commission to give them a grant vs. a loan. The loan would make their success much harder. Roger Peters, Chairman of the Hospital Board, said the \$500,000 transfer today is about 2 weeks worth of expenses. They are getting back on right road, but this won't be enough to get them all the way to July 1. He encouraged the Commissioners to find additional funding and to make it a grant and not a loan. Armand Drummond, Clinic Manager, said his children have never received finer care than from this hospital. He came from Salt Lake and has a unique perspective of this issue because you don't get this type of care in other places. He would choose to use this hospital rather than go elsewhere. Kristen Housley, an employee of the hospital for 21 years, stated she had worked under several administrators and experienced other management companies coming into the facility when the hospital was worse off than it was now. Employees were hurt financially and management was fired so these companies could put their people into place. The motive of these firms is to make money for them and not us. She asked the Commissioners to give current management a chance to fix what is wrong. Eric is very good at managing things and totally took responsibility for this. The staff is supportive and they will do what they can to help. They know what the problem is and

they know what they need to do to fix it. Chairman Connelly closed the Public Hearing at 11:34 a.m. Commissioner Archibald said that she toured the hospital 2 years ago and was inspired by the staff as it is a strong part of who they are, but mistakes were made and the bottom line got lost. The Commissioners need to be good stewards of the money that Lincoln County has, and had concerns on how they approach this. She pooled resources to figure out what questions to ask about hospital financing and feels they need to attach strings to the money that is given so that things will turn around for the better, she knows QHR maybe isn't the answer. She said Curtis and Eric were the checks and balances for the bottom line and this didn't happen. She doesn't want the hospital to fail. Commissioner Connelly said that absolutely they are going to attach strings to the money that is given. Many people are coming to them for money and the hospital isn't the only one. They need to let the public know what is going on, and appreciated those that came and made comments. The Commission can make recommendations and have agreements but want control of how the money is spent that is given to the hospital. Commissioner Archibald moved to pass the resolution for the purpose of amending the budget to transfer money from the Unreserved Fund Balance in the amount of \$500,000 to create a new revenue and expenditure account for the South Lincoln Hospital Agreement Fund with money being distributed on a month to month basis. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried

Commissioner Archibald moved to adjourn for lunch at 12:07 p.m. and Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried. Regular session resumed at 1:30 p.m.

PARA 5: Chairman Connelly opened the Public Hearing at 1:35 p.m. for budget amendments. No public comments were received. Commissioner Archibald moved to sign the resolution to approve the Homeland Security grant amendment for additional staff and Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 6: Commissioner Archibald moved to sign the resolution to approve the SLIB grant amendment for the Afton Ambulance and Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 7: Landfill Manager, Bob Rawlings met with the Commissioners. The Commission opened the bid to drill the monitoring wells. Only one bid was received and it was from Thomas Drilling LLC in the amount of \$45,380. Commissioner Archibald moved to award the bid to Thomas Drilling in the amount \$45,380 for the drilling of 5 monitor wells at Strawberry Landfill. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 8: SEH met with the Commissioners on the courthouse study that was done and went over the designs for expansion and discussed the costs associated with it.

PARA 9: Commissioner Archibald moved to go into Executive Session at 3:06 p.m. with Ryan Lyman, Scott Wakeman and Brandon Brooks on personnel issues. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried. Commissioner Archibald moved to

return to regular session at 3:47 p.m. and Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 10: Justin Visser with the Town of Afton met with the Commissioners and gave a Civic Center update. He's trying to set up a fee schedule and showed his 2 proposals to the Commissioners. Estimated operational costs are \$30,910 for electric, gas, cleaning and maintenance.

PARA 11: The Commissioners met with Elected Officials and Department Heads on county discussion items.

PARA 12: Commissioner Archibald moved to approve the following Addition/Reduction to Assessment Roll and Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried. EOG Resources Inc - \$2.26; \$22,537.18, \$32,111.91; Encana Oil & Gas - \$84.58, (\$63.85), (\$956.76; Lance Oil & Gas – (\$825.86); Gerald Griffiths, (\$843.71)

PARA 13: Commissioner Archibald moved to approve the vouchers submitted and Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Commissioner Archibald moved to adjourn the meeting at 6:04 p.m. and Commissioner Harmon seconded the motion. Motion carried.

March 5, 2008

Chairman Connelly called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. Others in attendance included: Commissioner Archibald; County Clerk, Jeanne Wagner; Commissioner's Secretary, Corey Roberts. Commissioner Harmon was absent from the meeting.

PARA 1: Commissioner Archibald moved to approve the agenda for this day and Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 2: Planning Director, John Woodward went over the Planning Agenda.

PARA 3: Jeanette Fagnant gave the development permit report.

PARA 4: Jeanette discussed 421 SS 07 – Wild Remuda; Scott Terry is the applicant. Commissioner Archibald moved to approve file #421 SS 07 a simple subdivision with findings A-B and resolution of approval. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 5: Jeanette discussed 402 SS 08 – Gunner Flats Subdivision; Rollin & Tami Gardner are the applicants. Commissioner Archibald moved to approve file #402 SS 08 simple subdivision with findings A-B and resolution of approval. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 6: Jeanette discussed 403 SS 08 – Mountain Springs Subdivision; Brent & Jessica Odjick are the applicants. Commissioner Archibald moved to approve file #403 SS 08 simple subdivision with findings A-B and resolution of approval. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 7: John discussed 121 PZ 07 – Conditional Use – PUD-Sterling Ridge; Lee and Naunie Hyde are the applicants. Gaylyn Semadeni needed clarification on the 25 acre lot and wanted to verify that the project could only have one access. She feels the pictures she presented to the Commissioners show the problems that they face with safety. They would like a road study done along Spring Creek to make sure it is ok to have that many vehicles going up and down the road. Terri Webb said Spring Creek Road is not just a residence road but an access to the forest. She is concerned that they are going to approve this and they will be approving for 34 new homes, but that is more than what is there now. She urged the Commissioners to wait for a study on Spring Creek Road and ensure it can go for 34 more residences. She would like the open space to be addressed on the plat for agriculture or conservation only, and there should be an access out Bitter Creek. Lee Hyde stated he and his wife obtained property from relatives and had the intentions and hopes to maintain it completely open. It took 2 years to plan for the original plat and the rezone. They wanted 50% of the land to remain open and be able to offer affordable housing. The people of the community wanted what he proposed but didn't want it by them. The main problem with the project is the Spring Creek Road and clustering. 6 lots are designated for his children and he is not putting in 34 residences. He discussed accidents on the road that dealt with illegal use of minors driving 4 wheelers. The traffic that his project will generate will only involve half of the road. He said the environmental and conservation studies need to be done and if they fail then the project cannot be done. Commissioner Archibald asked what road studies have been done. John stated intersection studies were done but not feeder roads. Lee said profit is not the point with this project, and if he had to use Bitter Creek to access the project, he would not do it because it would be too costly. Lyman Harmon discussed the Spring Creek Road and he doesn't want to see additional traffic on it. The accident with the 4 wheeler was because the people couldn't see the 4 wheeler at a far enough distance. He doesn't object to what Lee is trying to do but the access needs to be off Bitter Creek because it can handle it. Spring Creek has problems with closure in the winter due to blowing and drifting snow. Chairman Connelly said cluster development is the wave of what is going on around the state. They have problems with rural roads and the increase of traffic with development is an impact. They are headed in a positive direction with the project and appreciated all the public comments. Commissioner Archibald said most of the homes probably won't be duplexes within the project because the market doesn't demand them. Commissioner Archibald moved to approve file #121 PZ 07 a 17 lot Master Plan with findings A-B and conditions of approval 1-3. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 8: John discussed 102 PZ 08 Rainbow Meadows; Alan Motzkus is the applicant. Commissioner Archibald asked about the water. John said there's probably a great deal where the property is. She then asked about sewer, and John said conventional septic would be fine because of being on central water. Commissioner Archibald moved to

approve file #102 PZ 08, the Rainbow Meadows Master Plan for 19 subdivision lots with findings A-C and conditions 1-3. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 9: Jonathan Teichert discussed 103 PZ 08 Jordan Canyon Commercial Condominiums; Solitude Holdings, LLC is the applicant. Commissioner Archibald moved to approve file #103 PZ 08 with findings of approval A-D and conditions of approval 1-10. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 10: Jonathan discussed 104 PZ 08 – Condition Use Gravel Permit; Lincoln County and Ernest Thornock are the applicants. This pit is for county use and not for the sale of gravel. Commissioner Archibald moved to approve file #104 PZ 08 with findings of approval A-C and conditions of approval 1-3. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 11: John discussed 609 P 07 rezone proposal; Silver Star Communications, Inc. and Kendall Jenkins are the applicants. Commissioner Archibald moved to approve file #609 PZ 07 with findings A-J and resolution of approval. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 12: John discussed 120 PZ 07 PUD Master Plan; Silver Star Communications, Inc. and Kendall Jenkins are the applicants. Commissioner Archibald moved to approve 120 PZ 07 with findings of approval A-B and conditions of approval 1-4. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 13: Jonathan discussed 209 MS 07 Pine Creek North Subdivision; Ernest A. Thornock is the applicant. Commissioner Archibald moved to approve file #209 MS 07 with findings A-B and conditions of approval 1-6. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 14: Jonathan discussed 210 MS 07 Pine Creek South Subdivision; Ernest A. Thornock is the applicant. Commissioner Archibald moved to approve file #210 MS 07 with findings A-B and conditions of approval 1-6. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 15: Commissioner Archibald moved to sign the resolution to approve the petition for Fields of Gold to be removed the boundaries of the Bedford Water and Sewer district. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 16: John discussed 705 PZ 07 Suter's Canyon Phase Two; Fields of Gold, LLC and Bill & Lynnette Sharpe are the applicants. Kirk Sessions was pleased that it was a less concentrated project. He has concerns with the well, septic, and fire suppression. These all need to be dealt with. His biggest concern is the forest access and the project impacts the privacy of his property. Marlowe Scherbel had concerns with the historical access to the forest, and stated the Sharpe's are willing to provide public access. Most of the issues with the project were addressed during phase one. Blair Erickson said the

Sharpe's are responsible for the fence on the forest and they have never acknowledged that. Bill Sharpe said that was written into their covenants. Bill Sharpe said they have fire issues addressed in their covenants also. He said it was going to be a gated community and there are ways to keep motorized access out of the area. Commissioner Archibald moved to approve file #705 PZ 07 with findings of approval A-C, conditions of approval 1-6 and resolution of approval. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 17: John discussed 706 PZ 07 Triple T Ranch; Ronald Onkes is the applicant. Commissioner Archibald moved to approve 706 PZ 07 with findings A-C, conditions of approval with #5 to be amended to say: *The sub divider shall provide with CCR's, new fencing along the south border of the subdivision for animal control as needed* and resolution of approval. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 18: GIS Coordinator, Destry Dearden met with the Commissioners on a project. Commissioner Archibald moved for the Chairman to sign the contract between the County and Premier Data Services for data exchange and Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 19: Commissioner Archibald moved to approve the contract between the County and Star Valley Cleaning for the Planning and Extension Offices in the amount of \$1,180 and Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Commissioner Archibald moved to adjourn for lunch at 12:22 p.m. and Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried. Regular session resumed at 1:30 p.m.

PARA 20: Commissioner Archibald moved to sign the contract between Lincoln County Public Health and LUCDA. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 21: Commissioner Archibald moved to sign the resolution extending E.L. Clark Lane County Road No. 12-150 for the purpose of a cul-de-sac. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 22: Commissioner Archibald moved for the Chairman to sign the Quit-Claim deed from Lincoln County to Ken and Melese Nebeker and Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 23: County Engineer, Ross Turner went over the proposal for Ross Road which is to adopt a part of the road for primitive access. Numerous letters were received from the public on this issue. No action was taken by the Commissioners.

PARA 24: Commissioner Archibald moved for the Chairman to sign the Quit Claim Deeds to Val E. Harris and Debra G. Harris; Virgil D. and Sue Ellen Helm; Warren Waddle and Eloyce Helm Moffitt in regards to the public roads on the original Bellview (Smoot) town site plat. Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 25: Ross discussed a letter from the Town of Afton for a proposal to share the costs of repaving Papworth Lane, as part of the road is county owned. The Commissioners took no action on this issue.

PARA 26: Commissioner Archibald moved to sign the Right of Way Certification with WYDOT and Chairman Connelly seconded the motion. Motion carried.

PARA 27: Garry McLean with Sweetwater County met with the Commissioners on the MOU for Veteran’s Services which would involve Lincoln, Sweetwater and Sublette Counties. The Commissioners took no action on this.

PARA 28: Todd Jaynes met with the Commissioners on a proposal for the property at Sage Junction (old Stauffer site). He discussed a mixed solid waste disposal proposal and he thinks this would be an excellent site that could be used to benefit the region in this matter. Commissioner Archibald stated she would like to visit a facility like this that is currently operational.

PARA 29: Mike Hawkins met with the Commissioners on the La Barge Creek County Road. He gave a petition to the Commissioners that was signed by property owners along the road.

PARA 30: Linda Wood met with the Commissioners on the Kemmerer Senior Center and gave the facilities recent audit to them. She asked if the Commissioners would approve their employees coming onto the County insurance and the center paying the premiums. The Commissioners will take this into consideration.
